He grew up in East Vassalboro and was a graduate of Erskine Academy, class of 1941.

He and Nelson Smith founded China Rescue. Frank also served as deputy sheriff in China for many years. He was a member and past commander of Washburn-Brann-Ward American Legion Post 195 of China Village and later a member of Daniel E. Lambert Memorial American Legion Post 178 in Waterville.

Frank was an avid deer hunter and trapper with his son Roger.

He enjoyed selling flowers and vegetables at Marian Gardens Greenhouse.

He was predeceased by his parents; wife Marian; and brothers, Donald and Lloyd.

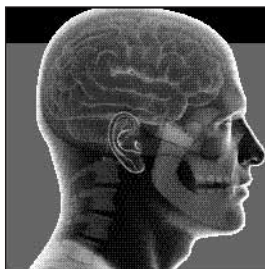
