SIDNEY—Manley L. Goodale, 92, of Sidney, formerly of Vassalboro, passed away on May 4, 2010. Manley was born December 28, 1917, and raised in the Benton and Fairfield area, the son of the late Archie Sr. and Eleanor (Knight) Goodale.

After his schooling years, he enlisted in the Army and was stationed in the Asiatic Pacific Theatre with the 103rd Infantry 43rd Division where he was the recipient of the Bronze Star medal. Manley served his call of duty in World War II until his departure back home to the United States in August of 1945. He married a wonderful woman, Nellie Gurney, and they spent many wonderful years together.

Through the years, he was a member of the Vassalboro Volunteer Fire Department and was also the town's police officer. Manley enjoyed raising beagles, and was proud of the many blue-ribbon winners that he raised. He was one of the original founders of the Waterville Beagle Club and enjoyed this hobby of running rabbits and raising his beagles.

Prior to his retirement, he worked many years as a textile worker for Wyandotte Industries in Waterville. Upon his retirement, he didn't sit long and went to work for School Union No. 52 as a bus driver in the Vassalboro area. Manley was a well-respected citizen throughout the area and was always willing to lend a hand to someone. For many years, he was a member of the firing squad for fellow comrades with Veterans of Foreign Wars Post No. 8835 in Winslow, a member of the Ronco-Goodale American Legion in Vassalboro, and a parishioner of the Vassalboro United Methodist Church.

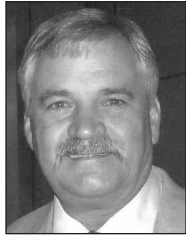

ROBERT WORTHLEY
WINSLOW - Robert "Randy" Worthley, 64, of Albion Road passed away on Saturday, May 8, 2010, at CMMC in Lewiston. He was born in Hawthorne, Nevada, on September 6, 1945, the son of Eugene and Dorothy (Leighton) Worthley.



Randy graduated from Mexico High School, in Mexico, in 1963. He went on to work for Oxford Paper Company in Rumford for several years. In 1965 he was drafted during the Vietnam Conflict but chose to enlist in the U.S. Marine Corps for three years. He completed his basic training in Parris Island, South Carolina. He served in many countries during his enlistment, most notably serving 13 months in the Republic of Vietnam. While serving in Khe Sanh, he contracted malaria and was wounded twice. He received the Presidential Unit Citation for extraordinary heroism as well as a Purple Heart but because of the extremely dangerous location, the presentations could not be made. In April 1983 when asked where he wanted his Purple Heart medal formally presented to him, he chose the MacCrillis-Rousseau VFW Post in Winslow.

After his discharge in 1968 he returned to his hometown of Mexico and resumed his position at Oxford Paper Company. He married his soul mate, Carol Moreau, on September 6, 1969, at St. Rose de Lima Church in Chisholm. In 1971 Randy enrolled in the electrical program at CMVTI in Auburn. In 1975 he received his master electrician's license and worked in this field until his retirement.

Randy has always been known as a veteran's advocate. He had been a dedicated volunteer for many years at the Veterans

Hospital in Togus. He became a member of the VFW while serving overseas. Over the years he held many leadership positions, attaining the highly honorable position of VFW State of Maine Commander in 2004. He was later chosen National Buddy Poppy chairman and served on several other national committees. Randy was elected as commander of his post for five separate terms.

He was a lifetime member of the Winslow VFW, the Waterville American Legion Post 5, the Disabled American Veterans, the Khe Sanh Veterans, and the Skowhegan-Madison Elks.

He was an avid outdoorsman from early childhood, enjoying hunting and fishing throughout the year. Many happy outings were enjoyed at the family camp in Oquossoc.

He is survived by his wife, Carol Worthley of Winslow; his two daughters and their husbands, Lori Gerencer and Tim, of North Yarmouth, and their children Alyssa and Alex, and Amy Meader and Lance, of Falmouth, and their children Jace and Jaelyn; two sisters, Diane Haines and husband Roger, of Camden, and their children Chris Haines and Tanya Kibler, and Deborah Henson and Mark, of Loveland, Colorado, and their children Wesley and Natalie Henson. He was predeceased by his parents.

UMaine Extension programs are open and accessible to all in accordance with program goals.

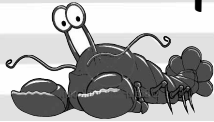
China student to attend Thomas

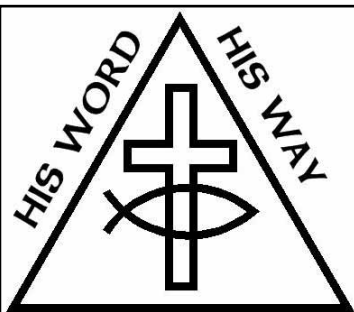
