

Culverts dominate selectmen's meeting

The June 8 Windsor selectmen's meeting opened with a public works update from Keith Hall. Hall said they had put three culverts in on the Erskine Road. He had prices for paving sections of the Weeks Mills Road, the Coopers Mills Road, and the Windsor Neck Road, the total of the paving equaling \$186,000. They also discussed fixing the end of the Barton Road by Phil True's house. They will close the road for two or three days.

Selectman Ed Hubbard suggested the town purchase a laser level and a calcium spreader for the public works department. Hall said the new truck has been undercoated and it runs nice. He said the most common question he has received from townfolk is whose house is that behind the truck on the town report. The answer is Whited Ford, the place where they purchased the truck.

Some residents were present to ask the town to dig out a submerged culvert on the Baker Road. The culvert is on private property, but the owner said the town can clean it out as long as it didn't cost him any money. There was much discussion regarding whose responsibility it was to dig out the end of the culvert. The selectmen decided that though it was the land owner's responsibility, the town would dig it out as the water backup was damaging the road. Selectman Marty Dow suggested getting a price first and Selectman Ray Bates said to get written permission from the landowner. Tim Coston gave a transfer station update. The town has no more large orange bags left, but does have small ones left. They are now using the tag system. The selectmen decided that if someone

arrives without tags, they will just pay the \$2, rather than put a tag on and throw it away. Recycling for plastic numbers 1, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7 will soon be underway. Lincoln County said that they will also recycle ridged plastics such as truck bedliners if the town pays \$1,000 to fix a can. Selectman Ray Bates said it would be a cost saving in the end. The selectmen decided to get their own price estimate on fixing the can.

The town opened furnace bids from C.B. Haskells, Augusta Fuel Company, and Webber Fuel. As there were many factor to consider, Selectman Rick Gray volunteered to sort through the bids and evaluate them.

Next the selectmen went over what accounts to write off. They had approximately \$4,000 left in the abatements line. They decided on personal property write offs through 2002.

There is a new flood insurance rate map available for viewing at the town office.

The meeting was selectman Ed Hubbard's last meeting. Selectmen Marty Dow said he had learned a lot from Hubbard.

Selectman Rick Gray said, "Your knowledge and expertise has been an excellent service to the town."

Selectmen Ron Brann praised Hubbard's open mind, saying Hubbard could be strongly in one direction, then listen and go in the other direction.

Selectman Hubbard quoted from a Clint Eastwood movie, "It's been good riding with ya."

Hubbard said he was most proud that he had fought to get Theresa Haskell in as town manager. "She has done an amazing job." Haskell thanked Hubbard for believing in her.
